Mr. Phil Dixon gave a report from the Board of Governors. He reported on the significant changes in the General Assembly and profiled a number of new members that could be "friends" of ECU and the UNC system. In addition, he discussed collaborative educational efforts between the United States and China.

He also said that the Trustees would like to have that kind of dialogue with students on a more regular basis to gain a better understanding of student issues.

The Board of Visitors will add a fourth scholarship this year. The Board of Visitors is reaching out to former members to contribute to Access Scholarships.

Mr. Lucas moved that the candidates for degrees, as approved by the Faculty Senate and the Chancellor, be authorized for conferral on Friday, December 17, 2010, at the annual Fall Commencement. The motion was approved with no negative votes.

FACILITIES & RESOURCES COMMITTEE

Mr. David Redwine, chair of the Facilities and Resources Committee, gave the report. A summary of the report is included as Attachment G. There were several actions that required Board approval.

Mr. Redwine moved approval to move forward with the Student Union Project conceptually to the design phase, including a parking deck, and them return to the Board for discussion. After a brief discussion, the motion was approved with no negative votes.

Mr. Redwine moved that the Board approve the Parking Fee Proposal in accordance with the terms and conditions provided in the Board materials. This proposal is included in this document as Attachment H. The motion was approved with no negative votes.

Mr. Redwine moved that the Board approve the revised request to purchase +/- 1.9 acres of land for \$1.00 to site the Dental Clinic Training Center in Elizabeth City, NC, with a clear deed and a separate recorded agreement with stipulations. A summary of this request is included as Attachment I. The motion was approved with no negative votes.

Mr. Redwine moved that the Board approve the lease of clinical space in the Leo Jenkins Cancer Center to Pitt County Memorial Hospital in accordance with the terms and conditions provided in the Board materials. The motion was approved with no negative votes. In addition, Mr. Redwine moved that the Board approve the lease of space in the Leo Jenkins Cancer Center to NewCo Cancer Center, LLC in accordance with the terms and conditions provided in the Board materials. The motion was approved with no negative votes. The details of these leases are included as Attachment J.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Mr. David Redwine presented the motions from the Executive Committee.

Mr. Redwine moved that the Board approve the conferral of tenure for Dr. Jan Wong, Professor and Director of the Breast Cancer Center, Section of Surgical Oncology, Department of Surgery, Brody School of Medicine and Dr. Patricia Fazzone, Dean of the Honors College. The tenure recommendations are included as Attachment K. The motion was approved with no negative votes.

Mr. Redwine moved approval of the proposal of tuition and fees for 2011-2012 as presented in the board material. The proposal is included as Attachment L. The motion was approved with no negative votes.

Mr. Brody said that it is the consensus of the trustees to have student discussions on a

regular basis so all trustees can participate. Mr. Brody said that he would work with Tremayne

Board's responsibility, he said. The Board needs to understand them better and make sure that

the proper governance is indeed in place, he said..

Chancellor's Remarks 11/19/10

Welcome and thanks for all you do for ECU.

I want to start by recognizing two very good people. First, help me welcome Dean Rick Niswander as our Interim VC for Administration and Finance. He has some huge shoes to fill... literally, have you seen Kevin's feet? Seriously, Mr. Seitz has made a huge difference for ECU and I'd like to recognize both Kevin and Dr. Niswander at this time.

Both of these people have strong technical skills, but beyond that they are both first rate leaders ... with integrity, great organizational skills, and team behaviors. I am also happy to announce today that the Executive Council has made a donation of over \$600 to the <u>Gail Jordan Scholarship Fund</u> in the name of Kevin and Pat Seitz.

Budget

Need to discuss Budget Planning. Speaking to our students and faculty....

Tuition

Mr. Seitz led an excellent discussion yesterday on campus-based tuition and fees, so I won't repeat that. I will say that it pains me to recommend large increases in what students have to pay for their education because step # 1 in "Student success" is access and affordability. Our vision is:

... delivering on the promise of opportunity"...

and we cannot deliver on that promise if we can't get the students here or if they can't afford to stay. Today on a national level, more than 60% of prospective students say "they will have a difficult time affording a college education."

That said, we are in extraordinary fiscal times and we will do all we can to maintain the <u>quality</u> of our academic programs... that is step #2 in student success.

Regarding state budgets, I think that everyone knows that a revenue gap of about \$3.6 billion is predicted for next year and since education is a discretionary spending category, we could see large base budget cuts. For example:

- The current estimates are that each campus would lose between 10% and 18% of their base budget, depending on whether the temporary sales tax is renewed;
- If the cuts stay between 10-13 percent, ECU would lose 30 to \$40M;
- A big change will occur this year in the Board of Governors because half of its members are up for reappointment and we do not know how this will affect the System.
- We are forced to make decisions about revenues 6 to 8 months prior to knowing what state appropriations will be.

Because of the great job Mr. Seitz and all divisions have done, we think we are prepared for a 10% cut, but it won't be pretty. In rough terms, about 50% of the \$ 30M would come from "Kevin's savings bank" that he has been building for the past three years. The remaining 50% would come from:

- Supplemental tuition (about 25%);
- Our emergency fund (about 10%); and
- Unit reductions of less than 2%.

Base cuts above 13% or \$40 million will require a different approach to our university. We are working right now on the details, but cuts above 13% would certainly mean a smaller university, cutting services, consolidating units, losing vacant positions, large cuts to some colleges, a hard freeze on hiring, and evaluation of vertical program cuts. Also at that level, assuming we have the authority, we would have to consider more supplemental tuition increases. One thing for sure is that I will not allow the common approach of "letting everyone die a slow death"... also known as across the board cuts.

Two more elements to budget planning are important for the Board's understanding.

- First, it is almost certain that no planning for <u>capital projects</u> will be allowed for the coming year, so our Bio-science building will be further delayed. We do anticipate some funding for repairs and renovations, which is vital for older campuses like ours; and
- Enrollment growth funding remains the single biggest source of operating dollars and we will need your help to secure funding for enrollment growth for next year. This is a much more significant source of revenue, at least historically, than campus based tuition. This year, for example, we realized 14.9 million dollars from enrollment growth. ECU has an excellent opportunity for future growth. Plus, we currently meet all the BOG performance requirements. So, this source of legislative support is vital to us.

Athletic Conferences

Everybody is interested in this question and recent expansion announcements by the Big East have caused a frenzy of activity. Coach Holland has made several public statements and I won't repeat his excellent analysis. I will summarize my perspective and ask for Board support:

- 1. Conference USA remains an excellent location for us, especially as the conference give serious consideration to expanding its teams and building regional sub-conferences. In addition, a chance exists for us to achieve automatic qualifier status if we find a mutually beneficial merger with the Mountain West. Many discussions are in the works and we just need to see where they end up;
- 2. Coach Holland has controlled all the variables he can control to this point...especially our revenues, our facilities, and our national exposure. All of this positions us well for the future, regardless of what conference we are in.
- 3. Last, in spite of his efforts and our success in CUSA, we do not have the TV market share that large cities like Dallas or Orlando have and that market share will continue to be a barrier for us.

Strategic Priorities

We continue to fund and advance our strategic priorities in spite of tough budget times. The Honors College is a prime example, and I assure you that Dr. Sheerer will make that a success. In addition, I am very proud that we are finding more revenues for graduate education, thanks to the leadership and dogged perseverance of Vice Chancellor Mageean and Dean Gemperline. Over 1 million dollars in new permanent funding was given to graduate programs this year and now we are close to dedicating some additional revenue streams from pouring rights contracts to merit scholarships and to graduate stipends and tuition remissions. Graduate education has become vital in the job market of today and we expect the demand for strong graduate education to continue to increase.

In addition, we are self funding nearly 8M in order to build vital research space on campus. This 8M will go towards the Heart Institute and virtually complete the plans for that building.

Dr. Ross

Finally, I am about one month away from having a new boss, Dr. Tom Ross and I'm getting to know him all the time. He will visit our campus on February 15th and we will be inviting the Board to join us for some of the discussions. We hope to show him the same sort of quality, authenticity, and spirit that we showed the UNC Tomorrow Commission... as well as many others over the past few years.

Chair of the Faculty Remarks

November 19, 2010

Good morning! I bring you greetings from the faculty. I would like to recognize my faculty leadership team – Vice Chair – Dr. Mark Sprague (Physics), Secretary – Mr. Hunt McKinnon (Interior Design and Merchandising), and Parliamentarian – Dr. Brenda Killingsworth (Business).

A few years ago, the university was met with a budget crisis, which prompted emotional uncertainty from the faculty about the state of the academic core. They worried about the fate of fixed-term faculty and insecurity relating to under-productive programs, as defined by GA. As predicted, these feelings are being experienced again as we face renewed budget woes and unpredictability about the NC Legislature and changes to General Administration leadership. Amid this climate, the faculty remain cautious and look to the leadership of our university to provide guidance and transparency about the state of our budget and affects on our academic core. We have been fortunate that our financial and senior leadership, including Chancellor Ballard, has been transparent in decisions regarding our budget and how enrollment growth funding has contributed to our financial health. Many universities are not as transparent as ECU, in sharing its budget management as VC Seitz has done, with the faculty leadership and faculty senate. We look to our new leadership, under Interim Vice Chancellor Niswander, and his interaction with the University Budget Committee, in continuing to inform the faculty senate and general faculty about the state of financial affairs. Provost Sheerer and I have agreed to meet with this faculty senate committee throughout the year and to assist with the dissemination of budget updates with the general faculty. In all circles and committees, both at the university and UNC system level, faculty are concerned about our financial health and want to be involved in making decisions about possible faculty and program cuts. Concerns are mounting about possible program curtailment, with the establishment of a UNC system-wide committee on program curtailment, as chaired by our own Provost Sheerer. Speculations about the elimination of tenured faculty, in the event of program elimination, are growing. I ask the BOT and senior administration to continue to have open dialogues and discussions with faculty and faculty senate committees (EPPC) in the event of such decisions, to involve the faculty in such decisions, and to uphold the process as outlined the Faculty Manual, in the event of program elimination, which could potentially affect tenured and non-tenured faculty.

Now for more positive news, the Faculty Manual review and revision continues, and which will be 65% completed following our Faculty Senate meeting in two weeks. We have a 50+ page agenda, which 26 sections of the faculty manual. We have so much to discuss that the Agenda Committee is even timing my comments, so we can devote more time to our business – to get the Faculty Manual completed! Following the January Faculty Meeting, 75% of the manual will be completely reviewed! It has become a goal for all of us, especially the key Faculty Senate committees! My goal is to have the entire manual completely revised by April, and beginning

with the organization of the new Faculty Manual in the Summer of 2011. Again, I cannot overstate the time and effort that has gone into this process. By reviewing each section in the manual, we have uncovered not only outdated information, but have added new sections that pertain to contemporary issues such as training for Distance Education courses (a SACS requirement), updated information related to personnel records, and updated Academic Policies. Our matrix tells our story and I have a new one for Chair Brody and Mr. Greczyn, a member of our Faculty Manual Steering Committee, and of course, Chancellor Ballard. At the end of this year, we will have new language and an organizational outline for the ECU Faculty Manual. Thanks to our faculty and administrators who have been diligent in their work on this endeavor. We will have the best faculty manual in the state!

Lastly, I want to remind the BOT about the productivity of our faculty in the areas of teaching, research, and service. Many faculty, representing all academic units, have dedicated countless hours to university service, including work on the faculty senate and its committees, to SACS committees as we work towards reaffirmation of our accreditation, strategic action planning and the Baldridge Award, and participating in Foundations of Excellence –a self-study examining our first year program (freshman) and transfer student experiences, and ultimately - retention. Now keep in mind that these service activities (to the university, college, and department) are not counted toward the faculty workload, although service is an important aspect of the responsibilities of the tenured and tenure-track faculty member. Faculty are teaching larger classes, both face-to-face and online in their discipline with many teaching at multiple levels – undergraduate, master's, and doctoral. Our online faculty are the same faculty in our face-to-face classrooms, which demonstrates the quality of our academic programs. In addition to higher teaching demands, the faculty must also be engaged in productive scholarly work, including the mentoring of students, in such areas as basic research, creative activity (as in the fine arts), engagement, outreach, and innovation. Also included in this area are the submission and management of external funding and grants, which are timely to both write and administer. Yes, and many of us also engage in patient care and clinical supervision of our students in clinical settings. Much of the data and outcomes representing student graduation and retention rates do not reflect the countless hours spent in the traditional roles of the faculty member. The faculty tirelessly and unselfishly share their knowledge with our students, to offer a quality education in a variety of disciplines, which teach them how to think, problem solve, be a leader in a field, and engage in inquiry at many different levels. Our dedication and roles know no boundaries. We are dedicated to our university and to the education of our students.

To close, let me thank each of you for your commitment to our university. The faculty truly appreciate your support and the stability you provide to East Carolina University.

Health Sciences Committee November 18, 2010

PCMH Update:

- Brian Floyd, Executive Vice President of PCMH, reported on the fiscal year end budget and noted that the hospital is in good shape for moving forward in the new fiscal year.
- Dr. Ronald Perkin, Chair of the Department of Pediatrics, and Mr. Sanjay Saha, Senior Vice President for Operations for PCMH, gave an update on the progress of the Children's Hospital –a full service Children's Hospital which will provide care that is patient and family-centered. Construction to begin July 2011 and closeout and occupancy by July 2013.

BSOM Update:

- Dr. Cunningham reported on:
 - BSOM revenue sources and options for expanding the practice which included the opening of the Moye Medical II facility and the Rapid Access location on Main campus.
 - o BSOM annual growth in extramural funding is higher than other colleges and returns in research expenditures is better compared to other colleges.
 - The BSOM enrolled the first patient nationally last week in the SPRINT (Systolic Blood Pressure Intervention Trial).
 - 40% of BSOM graduates now practice in NC; graduates who complete residency training at BSOM/PCMH – 75% practice in NC.
 - Medical School expansion is still a BSOM priority for this upcoming year. Will be working to promote the BSOM funding needs to our new legislators.

• Dr. Benson reported on:

o Integrated Approach to Cancer Services – BSOM and PCMH are working collaboratively to strengthen cancer care services locally and regionally. The resources from both entities will complement each other. Limitations on reimbursement of Medicare, the present billing model constitutes significant portion of ECU Physicians' practice plan deficit, over \$2M annually. The integration, NewCo Cancer Services, will relieve this deficit. Projected impact of the joint venture – 5 Year cash flow to ECU-P – \$6.5M. The joint venture will provide ambulatory services in most clinical disciplines via a new, private corporation jointly owned by PCMH & BSOM which will be governed by a Board of Managers (PCMH/BSOM representation). Projected launch date is April 2011.

• Mr. Jowers reported on:

- ECU Physicians financial performance and the steps that are being taken to improve performance – i.e., new clinic facilities, recruitment of physicians; new strategies to improve patients' clinical experience; stepping up billing compliance awareness and training; and working with Department Chairs to ensure timely invoicing of contract revenues and follow-up on outstanding receivables.
- Retaining a consultant to review GME issues and reimbursement levels.

Dr. Horns shared from the Division:

- School of Dental Medicine construction of the new building is progressing; accreditation site visit conducted with no recommendations – initial accreditation expected February 2011. School has received 400 student applications which are in the screening process for the class beginning in August 2011. Third modular unit will be delivered mid 2011 to house faculty & staff. Renovations of a portion of the BSOM are to begin soon to provide learning site and simulation facilities for students until the new building is ready.
- East Carolina Heart Institute had a very productive year even with no operating budget. Dr. Horns is working to advocate operating dollars for ECHI.

University Affairs Committee

Academic Affairs -

■ Bob Lucas made motion for the conferral of degrees. The motion was seconded and passed.

Research and Graduate Studies - Deirdre Mageean

- Shared information from the 2009-10 annual report. There are increased efforts on campus for funding and grants. She talked about how the programs that need attention and funding.
- Deirdre said coastal issues have taken center stage with hurricanes and BP spill. She committed \$7,000 to do an ad in the Chronicle of Higher Education listing programs and services and from that we received some pretty good recognition and inquiries about our programs.
- She added that we are trying to showcase how the priorities in our region and state need to be addressed and what we have at ECU to address them. From there, we can market this to tell our story and be strategic with our intentions and plans and get it in front of legislators and important groups. By doing this, it enhances the entire experience.

Athletics – Nick Floyd

- Facilities plan the goal of \$15 million is at about \$8.4 million for the practice facility for basketball and they are moving forward.
- Olympic sports complex there continues to be major work on the track and women's soccer complex and both are on track to be finished in the next couple months. There is also a team building that has gone to bid and is scheduled for completion for December 2011.

- Football before the season most people wouldn't have thought that we would have six wins and be 5-1 in the conference, but we are. Our defensive front seven have had a bunch of injuries and so things have been tough once in a while. We are bowl eligible for a record fifth straight year. We are 44th in the country in attendance, which is higher some schools at major conferences.
- Bob Lucas asked about possible bowl scenarios.
 - Nick said the Washington DC bowl and St. Petersburg locations are logical provided we don't go to the Liberty Bowl. That would be against ACC and Big East opponents, respectively.

University Advancement

Second Century Campaign Update Information

Discussion

- Campaign total is \$185.4M which includes \$8.4M raised by the Pirate Club for the new basketball facility. It appears that we will have a strong year end in the area of fundraising.
- Planned Giving opportunities continue to surface securing funds for future needs at East Carolina.
- National Philanthropy Week is in full force with many student activities underway. All proceeds from the Purple Pig banks will benefit Joyner Library. Mr. Dowdy thanked Mr. Brinkley for bringing his pig back to campus full of change.
- ➤ The Women's Roundtable event was held on 10/14/10 and deemed very successful with over 350 attendees who enjoyed keynote speaker Jean Chatzky, bestselling author and financial editor of NBC's *Today* and luncheon speaker Jeanne Robertson, nationally-known humorist. Mr. Dowdy publicly thanked Mrs. Kay Chalk for chairing the Roundtable for the past several years..

Other Advancement Highlights Information

Discussion

Mr. Buck was available for questions. The Committee approved a motion to recommend that the full Board approve the request.

University Debt

Mr. Seitz mentioned the University's indebtedness document in the materials and distributed a draft of ECU's Debt Management Guidelines.

Mr. Seitz presented information on foreclosures in the adjacent university neighborhood.

Parking and Transportation Services

2011-2012 Parking Fee Proposal

Recent Parking Improvements

- Deb Garfi was hired as the new Director of P&T in April 2010. She brings 15+ years of
 university parking experience to ECU, having worked at the University of Chicago and
 Northwestern University. Her background includes deck construction and management,
 alternative transportation and department process review and efficiency.
- Per recommendations from the Board of Trustees, additional available visitor parking has been researched on core campus. As part of the master plan study, P&T is continually monitoring campus to identify areas that require more visitor parking. With the placement of meters in higher traffic areas, revenues increased by 8% from FY 08/09 to FY 09/10.
- P&T has been working with the Master Plan consultant to identify areas for improvement and growth in the parking areas on campus. P&T continues to collect, interpret, and offer information to assist in the completion of the Master Plan.
- Restructuring, reorganization and training of the internal staff is continuing to provide improved customer service and efficient operation of the department.
- P&T has implemented alternative transportation programs to campus to introduce transportation demand management (TDM) concepts to the University.
 - o Zipcar a nationwide car sharing program.
 - Zimride a ride sharing network based on Facebook. ECU community members only are able to access the site.
- Continued to receive contributions from Athletics regarding maintenance of the parking areas associated with events. P&T began reviewing other free uses of parking in relation to the maintenance and operational costs of these lots.
- Lot improvements continued and upgrades were completed or in process at:
 - Willis Building completed
 - Belk Residence Hall completed
 - o Printing and Graphics (Harris Building) completion by December 2010

Parking Fee Background

- Parking is required by NC law to be self-supporting. Our primary goal is to keep fees as low as
 possible and base fee on paying for convenience. Commuting students using a Park and Ride
 option continue to pay the lowest fees (\$120 annually) in the UNC system.
- P&T made a payment of \$1.56 million to NC Public Schools based on the fine revenue lawsuit.
 This represents the first payment with a balance of \$2.6 million remaining to be transferred.

P&T continues to transfer approximately \$180,000+ to the ECU police for lot security. P&T has received a request to again transfer funds to Transit to cover operational costs. P&T was transferring \$250,000/year, but costs have been estimated to be nearly \$900,000/year.

Parking Fee Proposal

- To continue in the maintenance and upgrade of existing parking resources, and to plan for further parking demand, additional fee increases are necessary for the upcoming year. Due to expected growth of the university by 2019, annual increases are expected by P&T Administration and the Board of Trustees in order to provide the parking resources to support the Mission of East Carolina University.
- With the expected growth of ECU, additional parking assets will be required to provide service
 to meet this growth. Capital improvement and preventive maintenance plans have been
 developed to provide parking assets for a university on the rise like East Carolina University.
- P&T will actively support transportation demand management (TDM) principles and provide alternative transportation to the campus community. We will be developing Occasional Parking Program, Guaranteed Ride Home, and further development of Car Pools to make the TDM programs more effective and reduce the need for additional parking.
- P&T will continue to monitor, reallocate resources, recognize traffic patterns, and meet the parking requirements of East Carolina University.
- The Master Plan may reduce parking availability on core campus. Parking projects for the future are:
 - Moving freshman permit holders from the Dickinson Lot and increasing parking availability at the location they will be utilizing to also provide more park and ride spaces. Dickinson lot may be repurposed for vehicle storage and a new bus facility. New 1500 space lot - \$5 million.
 - o Upgrade gravel lots on 14th Street and Reade Street estimated at \$2 million.
 - Plans are being discussed for a parking deck in conjunction with new student union.
 The total cost for a 500 space deck is estimated at \$11 million with P&T contribution to be determined.
 - A new building is being planned for P&T, Police and Environmental Health and Safety.
 P&T contribution estimated at \$1.5 million.
- The proposal is for parking fees for faculty/staff to increase \$24 per year/\$1 per pay period.
 Reserved permit fees will not be increased because these fees were increased 43% in the last two years.

Request ECU Board of Trustees approval to purchase +/- 1.9 acres of land to site the proposed dental clinic in Elizabeth City, NC.

The land shall be purchased from Pasquotank County for the sum of \$1.00 subject to the conditions below. The deed will contain no restrictions. The County and ECU will execute a separate agreement in which ECU commits to use the property for only dental clinical services and dental education and, so long as they are not in competition with the neighboring hospital, for the provision of any other public, nonprofit health services or education purposes. Failure to adhere will entitle the County to seek relief through civil court proceedings. If ECU decides to sell the property, the County shall be entitled to receive fair market value for the land only.

A Phase One Environmental Assessment was conducted with no evidence of recognized environmental conditions.

Currently, the County leases the buildings on site to a restaurant. Prior to closing, the property shall be vacated. Request approval to sever the buildings from the property after closing.

Subsequent to ECU Board of Trustees approval, purchase is contingent on approvals from UNC-General Administration, Joint Commission on Governmental Operations and Council of State.

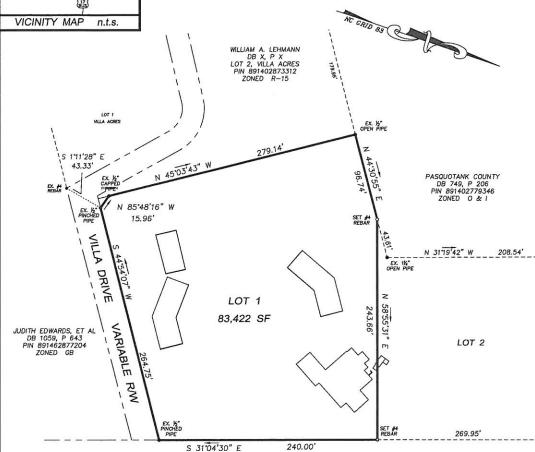

ECU Physicians seeks ECU Board of Trustees approval on two action items related to the proposed cancer center joint venture.

The first requested action item is to lease by disposition +/- 3,928 SF of clinical space within the first and second floors of the Leo Jenkins Cancer Center, Brody School of Medicine to Pitt County Memorial Hospital (please see attached for specifics). The average lease rate shall be \$18.97/SF/Yr not including janitorial and utilities, which will be billed separately, for an annual lease rate of \$74,514. After the first year term, the lease may be increased annually in accordance with the Consumers Price Index. Lease term shall be for five (5) years with one (1), five (5) year renewal option.

The second action item requested is to lease by disposition +/-32,353 SF of clinical space within the first and second floors of the Leo Jenkins Cancer Center, Brody School of Medicine to NewCo Cancer Center, LLC (please see attached for specifics). The average lease rate shall be \$16.62/SF/Yr not inclusive of janitorial and utilities, which will be billed separately, for an annual lease rate of \$537,690. After the first year term, the lease may be increased annually in accordance with the Consumer Price Index. Lease term shall be for five (5) years with one (1), five (5) year renewal option.

The first floor of the Leo Jenkins Cancer was built with State funds and ECU Physicians is seeking legislative relief on having to revert the lease proceeds. The second floor was built with Medical Faculty Practice Plan (MFPP) funds and ECU Physicians shall retain those lease proceeds.

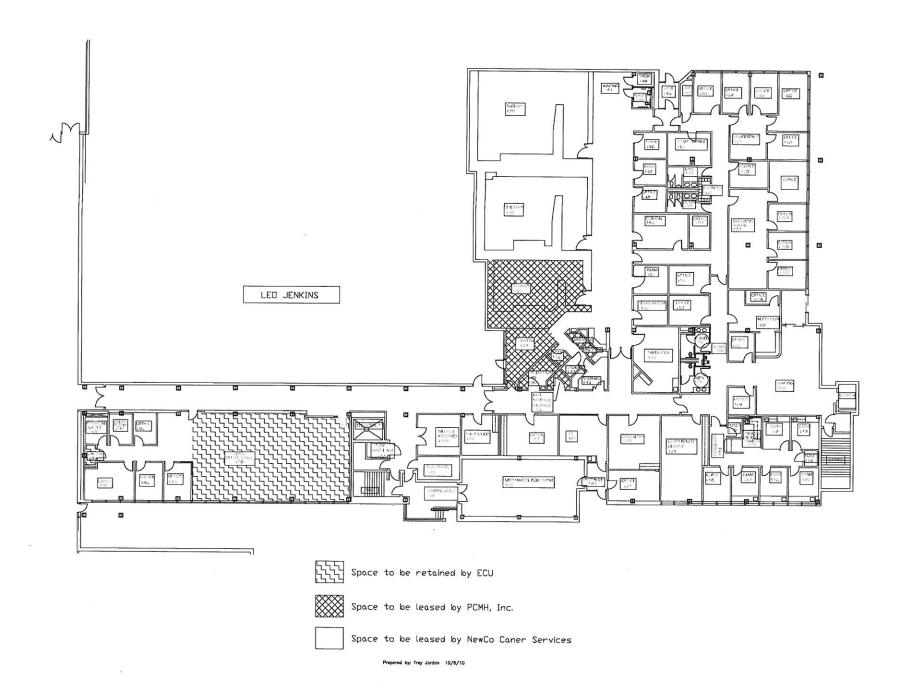
Due to the commingle of State and MFPP funded space, ECU Physicians delegated leasing authority shall not be utilized and the leases shall be handled via the State Property Office and they have expressed support of the proposed leasing plans.

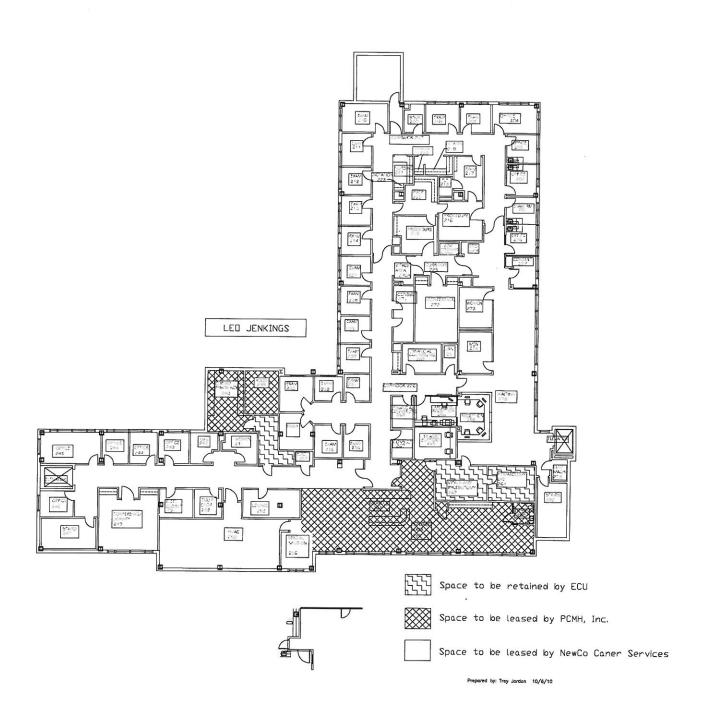
Subsequent approvals shall be the UNC Board of Governors, State Property Office and Council of State.

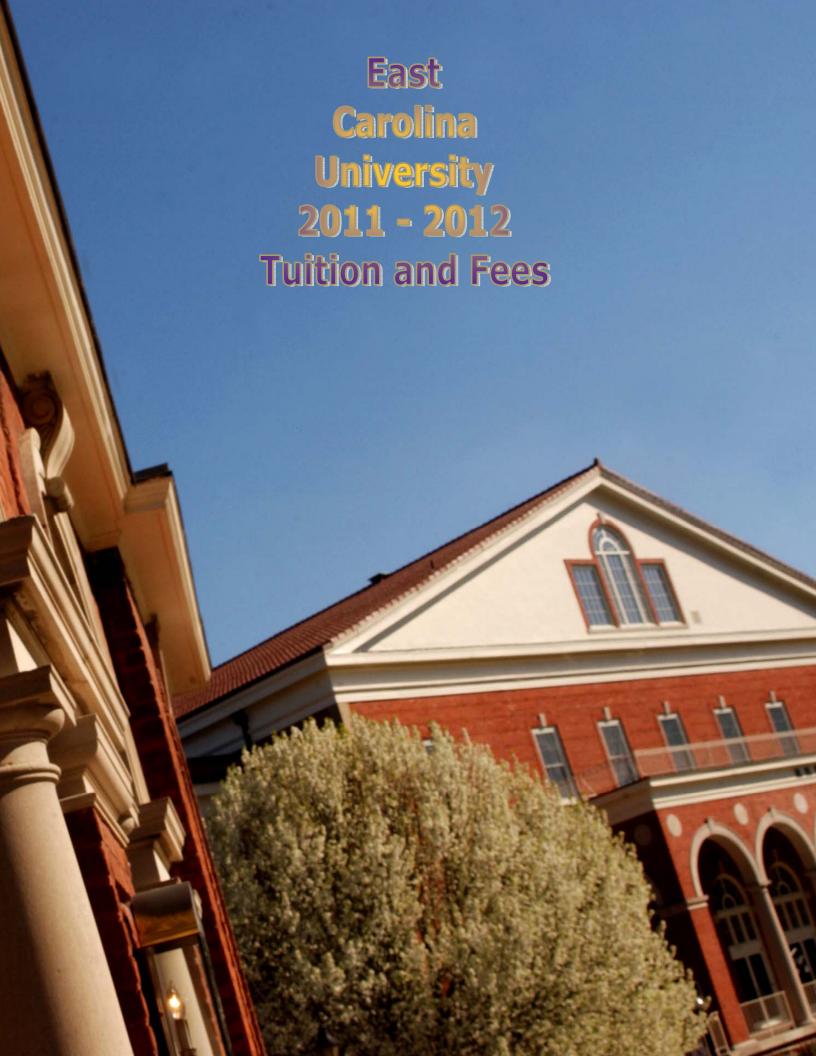

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY ECU 2011-2012 Tuition/Fee Proposal

I. Process

The purpose of this report is to provide the ECU Board of Trustees with tuition and fee recommendations that maintain access and affordability for students, preserve the service mission of the University and provide critical revenues to operate the University. The 2011/12 tuition and fee increase process began in April 2010 with the establishment of the Campus Based Tuition and Fee Committee (CBTFC). Chancellor Ballard's charge to the CBTFC was to maintain tuition and fee increases at minimal rates. He further charged CBTFC to consider:

- Enhancing student financial aid resources.
- Enhancing student educational experiences, success, and retention.
- Maintaining faculty salary levels.
- Augmenting auxiliary units with stable operational revenue.
- Maintaining ECU's historic commitment to the underserved.

Meetings were held monthly to review current tuition and fee policies, to provide updates on past rates and increases, and to discuss approaches to tuition/fee increases for 2011-12. The Chancellor's Executive Council reviewed the proposals along with the Student Government Association (SGA) and the Graduate and Professional Student Senate (GPSS). Student forums were conducted by the respective governing organizations, and increase proposals were presented to the GPSS and SGA Senate for recommendations.

II. Background

President Bowles and UNC General Administration strongly support increasing access and affordability for all students in the UNC system. The UNC Board of Governors' (BOG) policy limits annual campus-based tuition increases (CBTI's) to 6.5% for undergraduate residents (Appendix Attachment 4). President Bowles and the BOG approved a phased-in Supplemental Tuition Increase (STI) from last year of \$263 for resident undergraduates and \$387 for resident and nonresident graduates which will be implemented in 2011-12. Revenue from this increase offsets budget reductions taken in 2010/11. For planning purposes, UNC-GA recommends a second STI of \$0 to \$500 for all students in 2011/12. Not until the General Assembly meets will we know if a supplemental tuition increase will be implemented and if so, what amount will be permitted.

The BOG has determined that the maximum limit for CBTI's and general fees for resident undergraduates will be 6.5% each, not including debt-service fees. The base for ECU for 2011-12 is the 2010-11tuition rate plus the supplemental increase approved for 2011-12, which is referred to as the "adjusted base." Furthermore, BOG has determined that a minimum of the revenue generated from CBTI's must be used for need-based financial aid (25%) and the remainder for enhancement of the academic and student environment that improves student success and increases student retention and graduation rates (75%).

Increase proposals for tuition and general fees (Athletics and Education-Technology) are presented below for the BOT's consideration. There are also miscellaneous charges proposed for Housing, Dining and application fees. Use of revenues generated with the proposed increases are also described.

The proposed CBTI increases will yield an estimated \$6.8M for undergraduate and graduate students and approximately \$321,360 for medical students [Attachments 2 and 6].

The proposed CBTI increases for undergraduates will yield approximately \$6.5M. It is proposed that between 25% and 100% of this \$6.5M be allocated for financial aid; the precise amount is dependent upon the level of base budget cuts for next fiscal year as well as upon the availability of supplemental tuition to the University. Thus, the minimum that will be allocated toward need-based financial aid is approximately \$1.6M. Revenues not applied to need-based financial aid will either go towards merit-based scholarships, towards enhancement of the undergraduate student's academic experience or offset some of the budget cuts, if supplemental tuition is not available. The enhancement of the undergraduate student's academic experience will focus on program assessment and increases in student retention and graduation rates [Attachment 2].

The proposed CBTI for graduate students will yield an estimated \$309,199 in revenue. The allocation plans are the following: 25% (\$77,300) need-based financial aid; 62% (\$191,704) for merit-based financial aid (i.e. tuition remissions, graduate assistantships, scholar's awards); and 13% (\$40,196) towards enhancing the graduate student's academic experience [Attachment 2]. Dependent upon the level of base budget cuts and the availability of supplemental tuition, the University may need to adjust the above allocation to offset budget cuts.

The CBTI revenue generated by medical students will be allocated in two ways: 40% (\$128,544) towards need-based financial aid, and 60% (\$192,816) towards removing academic expenses from the ECU Physician's budget code or for covering anticipated State budget cuts [Attachment 6]. Dependent upon on budget cuts and the availability of supplemental tuition, the University may need to adjust the above allocation to offset budget cuts.

There is a possibility that the General Assembly will recommend that tuition increases will be used to offset the budget reductions at the respective UNC-system institutions. It is shown in Attachment 2 that with a \$100 increase in STI in all five student categories, there is a total revenue generated of approximately \$2.8M.

The possible tuition ranges (excerpted from Attachment 1) that would result with the proposed CBTI's plus the STI's (ranging from \$0 to \$500) are shown below:

IV. Fee Proposals

Proposed fee increases for all students are: \$40 for Athletics and \$60 for Education-Technology. The projected increased revenues include \$800,000 for Athletics and \$1,275,000 for Education-Technology (Attachment 3). The rationale for the increased revenue needs for Athletics is to offset annual maintenance and overhead expenses of new and improved facilities, and to assist in managing the loss of out-of-state tuition waivers for student scholarship athletes. Education and Technology fee increases will enhance student support services with the following: mobile versions of the Blackboard Learning Management System, lecture review and access, collaborative multiple use space classrooms with computers, software, video software and equipment, number of computer laboratories, and general educational supplies.

V. School of Dental Medicine

Fall 2011 will be the debut for the first dental medicine students. ECU is proposing to set tuition at \$21,000. In addition to the tuition, dental students will have specific fees that are unique to their professional school. These required fees total \$5,010/year (Attachment 7). A detailed narrative and supporting schedules are in appendix attachment 5.

VII. Generated Tuition-Fee Revenue in Relation to the ECU Total Budget

Over the last five years, student tuition revenue increased from \$65.6 million in 2005-06 to \$88.9 million in 2009-10 (Attachment 8), while state appropriations increased from almost \$219 million in 2005-06 (Attachment 9) to almost \$264 million in 2009-10 (Attachment 9). In the same time frame, required student fees increased from \$30 million to almost \$41 million (Attachment 8). With both other and required fees coupled with tuition, the total revenue generated in 2009-10 was \$134 million (Attachment 8), which is about 18% of the \$738 million (Attachment 10). The tuition-fee contributing percentage in 2004 was 15%.

VIII. Financial Aid

In 2009-10, ECU was able to meet 72% of the financial need of the undergraduate resident student population. In the following year, 2010-11, ECU met 60% of the financial need of the undergraduate resident population. This was a 12% decrease from the previous year (Attachment 11).

IX. Other Miscellaneous Charges

Undergraduate, Graduate and Medical Admissions have proposed a \$10 increase to the all application fees (Attachment 12).

Housing has proposed an increase of \$100 annually and Dining has proposed increases in meal plans between \$90 and \$150 annually (Attachment 12).

 - A lower tuition rate for the BSOM compared to UNC-Chapel Hill gives an unintended and negative connotation regarding the quality of the M.D. education

East Carolina University School of Dental Medicine Request for Tuition and Fees – 2011-2012

- Costs for dental education are unlike any other professional degree program in higher education
 - In addition to costs for faculty, support staff, and materials, dental schools must fund the operations of teaching laboratories
 - Consequently, the costs for dental education are normally higher than the costs for medical education
 - In medical education, an affiliated hospital serves as part of the teaching laboratories
 - Costs for operating and maintaining hospitals are accounted separately from medical schools
- The School of Dental Medicine (SODM) requests an initial tuition rate of \$21,000 for the first entering class of dental students in 2011-2012

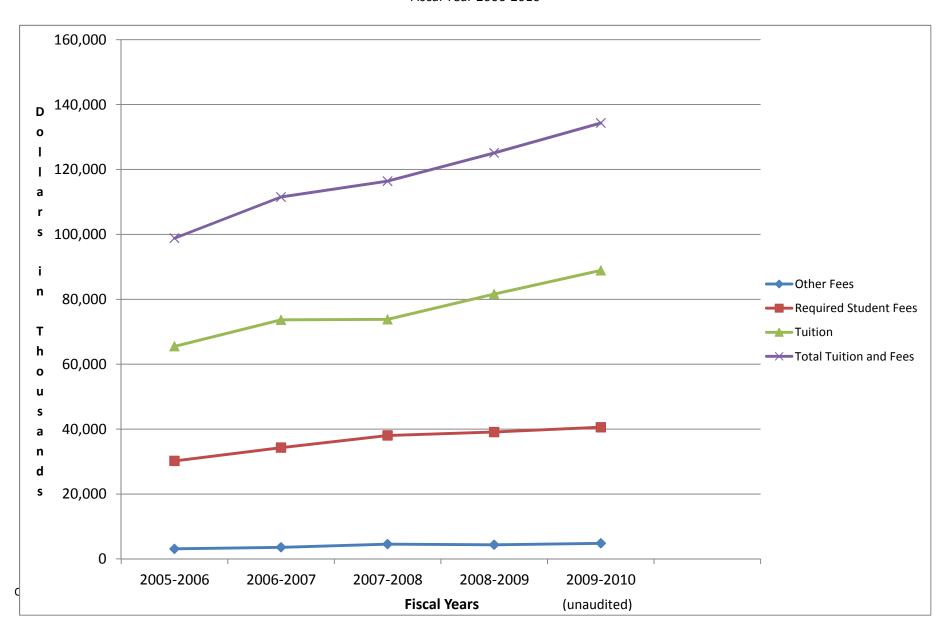

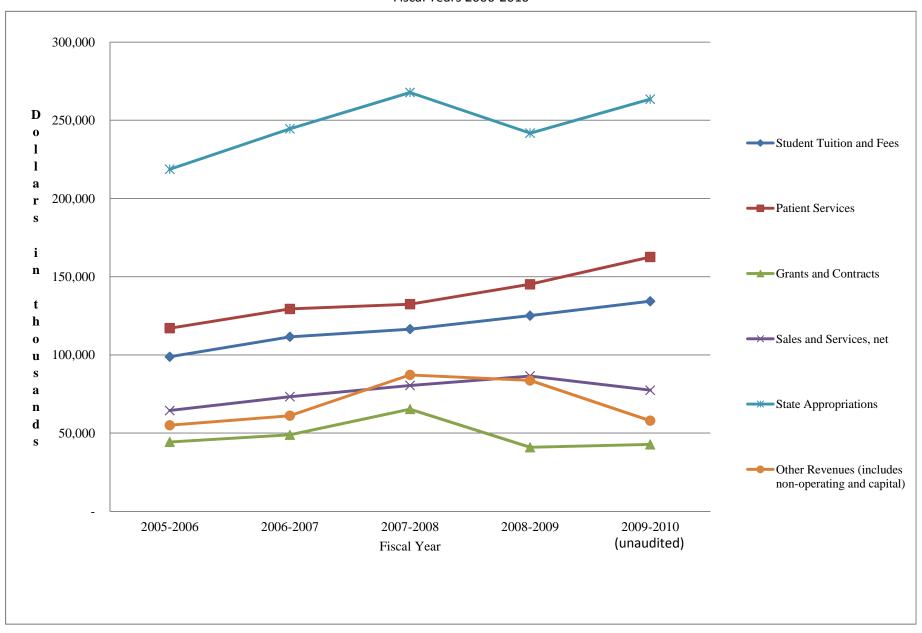

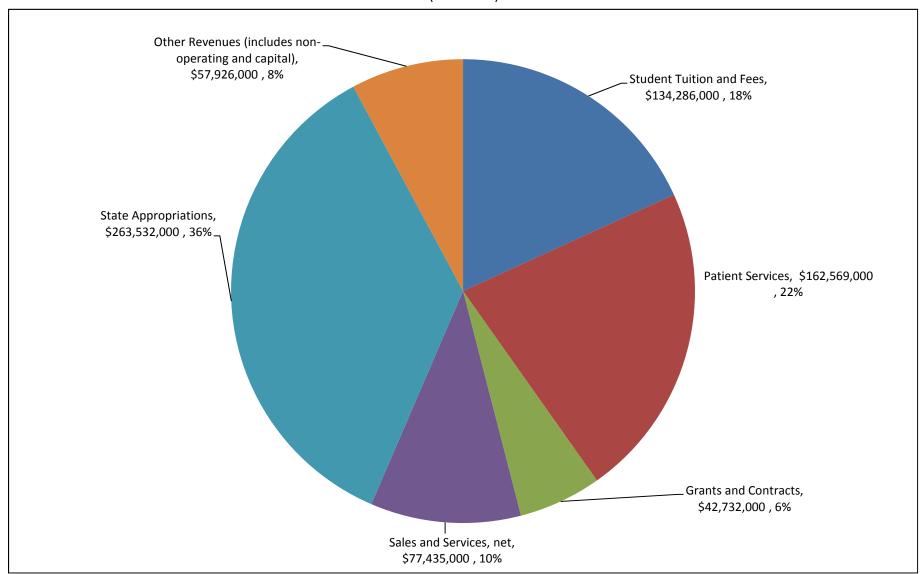

- Proposing increase of \$10
- Current rate is \$60

Justification

The increase is needed to offset permanent state budget cuts and to offset the cumulative effect of years of inflationary trends in the costs for publications, postage, other office costs and travel expenses (which are necessary for the recruitment of prospective students.

Dental School Application Fee

• Proposing a new application fee of \$80

Justification

The processing of dental school applications provide an added expense to the operation of the dental school. This fee is intended to cover these additional costs.

Room and Board Rates

Dining Services

Increase range from \$90 to \$130 annually depending on meal plan

- 9 meal plan \$2,560 to \$2,650; \$90 increase
- 14 meal plan \$2,900 to \$3,000; \$100 increase

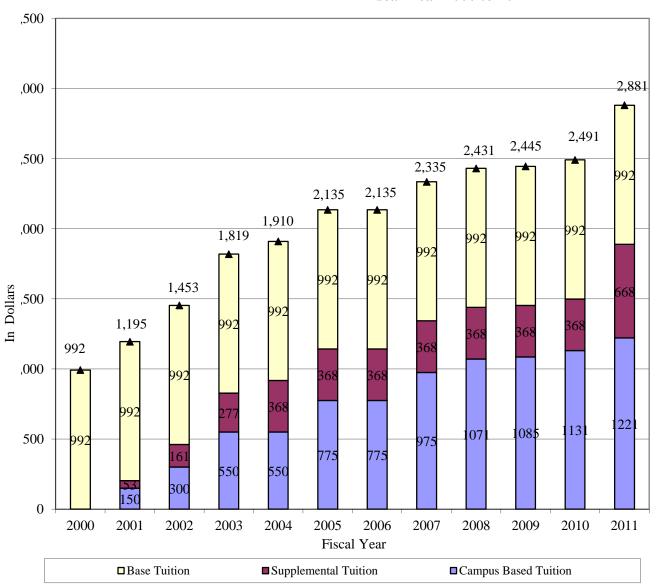

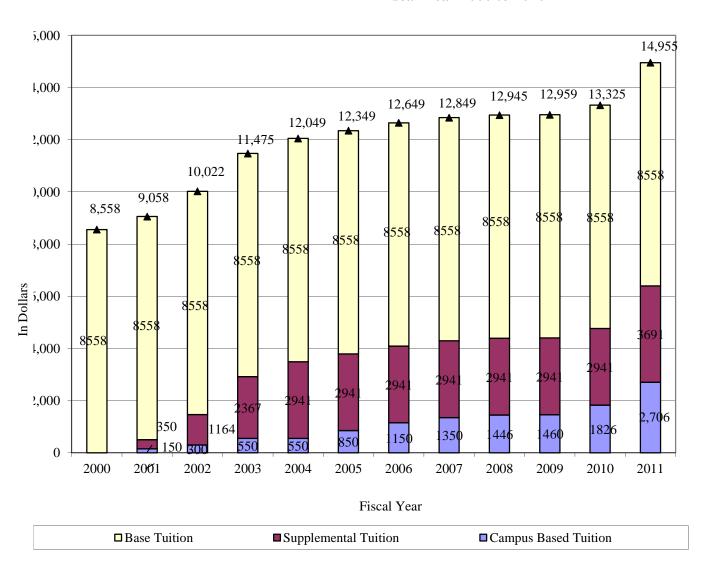
Appendix Attachment 3 East Carolina University Undergraduate Resident Tuition Rates Fiscal Year 2000 to 2011

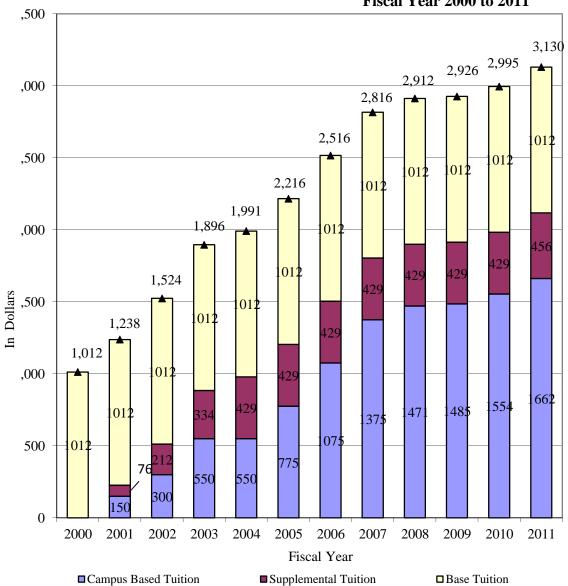
Appendix Attachment 3 East Carolina University Undergraduate Nonresident Tuition Rates Fiscal Year 2000 to 2010

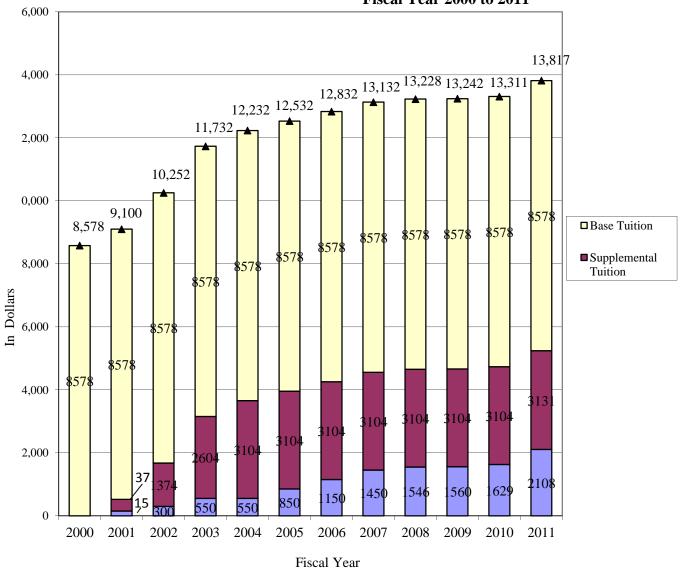
Appendix Attachment 3 East Carolina University Graduate Resident Tuition Rates Fiscal Year 2000 to 2011

The BOG/General Assembly initiated tuition increases but reduced state appropriations by an equal amount for the fiscal years 2001-2004 and 2011.

BOG did not approve campus based tuition increases in 2004 Graduate Nonresident students.

The BOG/General Assembly initiated tuition increases but reduced state appropriations by an equal amount for the fiscal years 2001-2004 and 2011.

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA Tuition and Fee Increases – A Second Four-Year Plan

The tuition policy of the Board of Governors, adopted in 1998 and revised in 2003 when the existing tuition and fee policies were combined, provides the framework for the Board's annual review and action on proposed increases in tuition and fees. This framework is used by the Board in fulfilling its responsibility under General Statute 116-11(7), which states in part that "The Board (of Governors) shall set tuition and required fees at the institutions, not inconsistent with actions of the General Assembly." At the same time that the Board exercises its statutory authority, it wishes to do so in a way that provides affordability for students, flexibility for the constituent institutions, and predictability for both the students and the constituent institutions.

In September of 2006, the Board approved a four-year plan that outlined guidelines for the campuses to follow in submitting annual proposals for increasing tuition and fees and the Board agreed to review those guidelines after four years. In August 2010, the Board reviewed recommendations from a working group for adjustments to the four-year plan and later reviewed responses from President Bowles to the working group's recommendations. At its October 2010 meeting, the Board debated possible adjustments. This proposed "Second Four-Year Plan" reflects those deliberations, and, if approved by the Board will provide guidance to the campuses for the next four years. At the end of the second four-year period, the plan would again be evaluated by the Board.

One of the requirements of the Board is that combined tuition and fee rates for resident undergraduates remain *within the bottom quarter* of each campus' public peers, as approved by the Board of Governors. Combined rates for non-resident undergraduate students should be market driven and campuses are expected to submit rates that reflect the full cost of providing non-residents with a quality education. Nonresident students in the University must be quality students that contribute significantly to the overall educational experience of all students.

It is proposed that the maximum rate of annual increase for campus-initiated tuition and general fees (Athletics, Health Services, Student Activities, and Educational and Technology Fees) for undergraduate resident students continue to be 6.5%. This figure is the average annual increase in undergraduate resident tuition rates from 1972 through 2006. Although the 2010 tuition increases raise the average tuition increases since 1972 to 6.6%, the recommendation is to continue with the 6.5% cap. The amount of the increase should be applied separately to tuition and fees, i.e., tuition may be increased a maximum of 6.5% and fees may be increased a maximum of 6.5%.

Fees required for debt service are *in addition to* this maximum percentage increase, but funds required to operate facilities are included in the maximum. Debt service fees are not included in the 6.5% ceiling because the projects that are financed by the indebtedness that is repaid from these fees are evaluated on their individual merits through a separate process. For projects to be funded from debt service fees, the Board will consider the total financial impact on students from these charges (both debt service and operating charges) and the ability of a campus to repay the debt as demonstrated through a financial analysis submitted by the campus when proposing the fee. The Board will also review the utilization of similar space on campus to determine that the additional space is needed.

It is hoped that the revenues generated under this plan, combined with ongoing efforts to control operating costs, will not only cover inflationary increases, but also will provide for consistent improvements in the quality of academic offerings.

All proposals for increasing tuition and fees must be accompanied by explicit plans for use of the increased funds. For the next four years, each plan must commit to set aside at least 25% of the new tuition revenues to be added to the campus pool of need-based financial aid. Additionally, at least 25% of the revenues must be used for increasing faculty salaries unless the average ranked faculty salary for a campus is at or above the 80th percentile of the average ranked faculty salary for that campus' peer institutions as approved by the Board of Governors. Any remaining revenues may be used to provide for improved library and counseling services, reductions in class size, increases in sections offered, enhancements in student services, and other purposes that improve the quality of the student's academic experience. Increases in student fees must be justified by an expenditure plan that shows how the additional revenues will directly benefit the fee-supported activity.

While tuition and fee charges are necessary as a secondary source of funding, the General Assembly has the principal responsibility for funding the University. For years in which the General Assembly is able to provide sufficient increased revenues, the need for increases in tuition should not be as great as in years when the General Assembly is not able to provide these revenues. Recognizing that the capacity of the General Assembly to fund the University varies from year to year, the following adjustments are to be applied to the maximum 6.5% campusbased tuition increase.

- For any year in which the General Assembly provides a specific campus a recurring increase in operating appropriations/FTE that is in excess of 6%, the maximum allowed campus-based percentage tuition increase for that campus in the subsequent year will be reduced by the percentage increase in operating appropriations above 6% (6% is approximately the average annual increase in operating appropriations/FTE since 1972). For example, if the General Assembly provides a recurring increase of 7% in operating appropriations (1 % above 6%) for a particular UNC institution, the proposed campus-based tuition increase in the subsequent year could be no more than 5.5% (1 % below 6.5%).
- It is important to understand that the ceilings on increases proposed in this plan apply to discrete sets of revenues. State appropriations and tuition receipts are the two major revenues within each institution's state budget account, yet they have very different impacts on campus budgets. In the following hypothetical example, if appropriations were to increase by 6% and tuition receipts were to increase by 6.5%, the overall budget would increase by 6.08%. The respective percentage increases for state appropriations and tuition (6% and 6.5%) should not be misunderstood and construed to be additive. If tuition and State appropriations increase by these percentages, and inflation, as measured by HEPI, remains steady at about 5%, the increases will provide campuses with modest new funding for quality maintenance and improvements.

Similarly, if revenues from general fees increase by 6.5%, the increase impacts only the budgets of fee-supported activities.

In the event that the General Assembly provides increased funding that results in the cap on tuition increases being reduced from 6.5% to \$0 or, alternatively, to a level below the average of the most recent three years of the Higher Education Price Index (HEPI), the Board may allow or even encourage campuses to submit a minimum tuition increase to ensure that increases over time are affordable and predictable. The Board should consider whether such a minimum increase in tuition is encouraged at its September meeting to allow campuses time to include a discussion of a minimum tuition increase in the normal campus tuition setting process.

To help mitigate the financial impact of tuition increases on students that are eligible to receive financial aid from the Board's need-based financial aid program, the Board of Governors will seek additional State funds for this purpose each year that this Plan is in effect. These funds, when appropriated, will be used to ensure that all North Carolina students that are eligible to receive our State need-based grants receive them, and that all such students are held harmless to the extent practicable from the tuition and fee increases.

The framework outlined above will apply to all institutions within the UNC system. The Board of Governors, however, recognizes that across the University, institutions vary appreciably in their missions, their programs, the costs of those programs including the costs of faculty, federal funding for financial aid, and the ability to meet the financial need of their respective student bodies. Recognizing those distinctions, the Board may choose to consider these criteria when setting tuition for individual campuses. A campus with a significant unfunded need may submit a proposal that does not adhere to the agreed-upon guidelines. Such a proposal must demonstrate that tuition revenues are the only viable source of funds for addressing the need. The proposal must be accompanied by a description of the need, and a detailed plan and rationale for addressing it. If the Board determines that the need could only be addressed by an increase in tuition above the maximum allowable campus-based tuition increase, it could institute such an increase.

Similarly, a campus that charges tuition or fees that differ significantly from those charged by similar institutions in the UNC system because the campus has held such rates at levels lower than those charged by similar UNC institutions may consider increasing tuition or fees beyond the cap to "catch up" to the rates charged by those similar institutions. In the event that a campus proposes to "catch up" through tuition or fee increases, the need for the increased funding must be fully justified and the campus should consider proposing that the increases be phased in over a multi-year period to lessen the impact of the increases on students.

East Carolina University School of Dental Medicine Narrative for Tuition and Fees for 2011

We are requesting that the tuition for ECU School of Dental Medicine (SoDM) be set at \$7,000 per term (3 terms per year) for eleven terms. This would be \$21,000 per year for years one through three and \$14,000 for year four. This tuition will be used for (1) Need-Based Student Financial Aid; and (2) General Institutional Support. (Schedule A)

In addition, the ECU School of Dental Medicine is requesting permission to assess student dental education fees in the amount of \$1,670 per term for eleven terms. These fees will be used to pay for a Dental Student Instrument Lease Fee, required Student Health Insurance, Electronic Textbooks, Comprehensive Risk Management, American Student Dental Association (ASDA) National and Local Dues, Pre-Clinical Dental Materials Fee and Long-Term Student Disability Insurance. (Schedule B)

The total cost of a four year dental education at ECU School of Dental Medicine, including estimated living expenses, and adjusted for inflation is estimated to be \$176,779 for the entering class of 2011. (Schedule C) In 2010, the four year cost of a dental education, including living expenses at UNC-Chapel Hill was estimated at \$182,742. (Schedule D) In 2009 the estimated mean for a four year cost of a dental education, including living expenses, for the thirty-seven public dental schools as reported by the American Dental Education Association (ADEA) was \$205,933. The \$176,779 estimated cost at ECU School of Dental Medicine is in the lowest quartile for all Public Dental Schools. (Schedule E) Additional demographic information related to Public Dental Schools is attached. (Schedule F)

It is recognized that the cost of a dental education is considerably higher than that of a medical education. The main reason for this is that the hospital serves as the teaching laboratory for medical students, while dental schools own and manage their own dental clinics as their teaching laboratories. The cost of these clinics and related personnel are reflected in the operating budgets of the dental schools and not related hospitals.

The original 2005-06 Operating Budget included sixty-seven faculty lines and a proposed appropriation of \$15,633,888. The Legislature authorized increases to EPA positions in the amount of 6.0% in FY 2006-07; and 4.0% for EPA non-faculty and 5.0% for EPA Faculty in FY 2007-08. If 50% of these Legislative authorized increases are added to the 2005-06 EPA budgeted lines the operating budget would \$16,500,000. This is the current proposed Legislative Appropriation for FY 2012-13. (Schedule G)

The proposed operating budget for the ECU School of Dental Medicine is projected to be \$18.958M in FY 2014-15 when the school has four complete classes of dental students. (Schedule H) The FY 2011-12 appropriation is \$11.5M with anticipated increases of \$3.5M in FY 2011-12 and \$1.5M in FY 2012-13. This will result in a total proposed state appropriation of \$16.5M. The proposed budget includes \$918,500 in student dental fees and \$1.54M in need-based student financial aid from dental student tuition. The operating budget does not include projected clinical revenues and expenses. We anticipate occupying our new dental building in fall of 2012. In addition, at the most, only six of the ten projected Community Service Learning Centers (CSLC) will be operational. Clinical revenues are projected to cover clinical costs, but will not be of sufficient magnitude to off-set tuition, fees, and state appropriation. The intent is to provide dental services to the under-served population of North Carolina at fee that is affordable. In order to accomplish this, fees will be set to recover cost associated with the delivery of dental services.

Justification for Tuition & Fees

Tuition: Tuition assessed to students will be utilized for two major purposes. They include:

1) Need-Based Student Financial Aid:

The SoDM at ECU was established to specifically address the shortage and uneven distribution of dentists in regions of North Carolina. Moreover, the dental work force lacks diversity, when compared with the state population. Central to the mission of the School is to recruit, admit, enroll and graduate talented individuals who reflect the diversity of today's society, provide them with the best possible dental education, and encourage them to become primary care dentists, serving in communities of need throughout the state of North Carolina.

To meet the needs of the students we are trying to recruit, we need to provide need-based financial assistance as they attend dental school. Few students are able to work during their dental education because of the rigors of the dental curriculum. Table 12 of the Annual ADEA Survey of Dental School Seniors: 2008 Graduating Class indicates that the average educational debt of graduates from Public Dental Schools is \$158,217. With this amount of debt, it is hard for dental graduates to practice in under served areas where the revenues generated by practicing dentists will be lower than in larger metropolitan areas. Both economic and population factors contribute to lower gross revenues.

Two ways to address the debt issue are by keeping the costs of a dental education as low as reasonably possible and to provide grants and scholarships to students to assist them in the costs of their dental education. As stated earlier, the projected cost of a four year dental education at ECU School of Dental Medicine in 2011 will be in the lowest quartile for all Public Dental Schools in 2008. We are proposing to provide forty-five percent of all tuition as need-based financial assistance to the students at ECU. Use of tuition to provide need-based financial assistance will allow the ECU School of Dental Medicine to assist students now while the school develops other revenue streams including federal support and endowments for the future. This arrangement will allow the SoDM to provide a reasonable amount of school-based support for students. In 2008, over thirty percent of all scholarships and grants provided to senior dental students were generated through the dental school. Per Table 27 of the ADA 2008-09 Survey of Dental Education, Volume 2, UNC-Chapel Hill was able to provide over \$9M in financial assistance to 275 dental students in 2007-08. With forty percent of projected tuition, ECU will have over \$1.54M for its 200 dental students.

2) General Institutional Support

With the ultimate addition of two hundred dental students and over twenty-eight dental residents, the support needed from the library, student services and central administration will be great. In addition, the physical plant costs associated with the new dental building and ten Community Service Learning Centers (CSLC) will add an additional burden on the physical plant operations of ECU. We are proposing to provide sixty percent of all dental student tuition to help off-set this increase in services needed.

Fees: In addition to the ECU fees that dental students will pay, we are requesting that student dental fees be assessed in the amount of \$1,670 per term for eleven terms. These student fees are comparable to the student fees currently assessed by UNC-Chapel Hill School of Dentistry. These fees are needed to cover additional costs of attending dental school that are not covered through student tuition or state appropriation. These student dental fees include:

1) American Student Dental Association (ASDA) National and Local Dues

We believe that dental students need to be involved in organized dentistry. ASDA, the student component of the American Dental Association, is the organization devoted exclusively to the Vice Chancellor for Adminstration and Finance

professional needs of dental students. This fee will cover national and local dues, and will allow the dental students to have a local chapter that they will manage and participate in.

2) Comprehensive Risk Management

While dental students will be supervised by faculty in the dental clinic environment at all times, it will still be necessary to insure them for Risk Management. With our commitment to keep patient fees as low as possible, we do not want to transfer this expense to patients. Note that it will still be necessary to cover resident and faculty risk management insurance through patient fees.

3) Required Health Insurance

ECU requires all full-time students to be covered by comprehensive health insurance. This fee will cover the cost of the University-provided health insurance.

4) Long-Term Disability Insurance

Dental students make a huge financial commitment to attend dental school. If the student becomes disabled and unable to complete dental school or to practice dentistry, this insurance provides protection.

5) Dental Materials fees

This assessment will cover materials used in pre-clinical courses. The high costs of disposable supplies and materials require that part of this cost be passed on to the students.

6) Electronic Textbooks

Most dental schools require students to purchase textbooks to support their educational curriculum. As have some other dental schools, the SoDM has made the decision to provide students with electronic textbooks. This option is both cost effective and it provides students with the ability to electronically search for information. Health Science education requires students and practitioners to use the proper knowledge tools to meet a complex and rapidly changing world. Use of electronic textbooks will allow ECU SoDM to use the proper formats and content to meet these goals.

7) Instrument Lease Fee

As part of their dental education, students are required to either purchase or lease dental instruments for use in both preclinical and clinical training. Due to the purchasing power of dental schools, leasing of instruments are approximately twenty percent cheaper than purchasing the instruments. In addition, school owned instruments are easier to manage and to ensure sterility, paramount for infection control compliance and patient safety.

8) Dental School Application Fee

The processing of dental school applications provide an added expense to the operation of the dental school. This fee is intended to cover this additional costs. It is standard practice for dental schools to assess an application fee.
